





What the Future Holds – the example of Suzy

REMOTE HEALTHCARE MANAGEMENT: Giving patients timely healthcare services

Suzy has booked a convenient time for a remote consultation with her care team between meetings, while she works at home, and shared her personal history, care plan and recent trends 48 hrs in advance with the team so they can provide advice given some conflicting material she cannot understand from the internet.





Findings

When 62-year old Mike Cooper, a former CEO, suffered a stroke, he turned to an online personal health record (PHR) tool to communicate with his doctors, schedule appointments, view lab and test results, and renew prescriptions from the comfort of his own home. "I have good information on which to base my decisions. The login procedure has a sign-in name and a password, and that really makes me makes me feel safe," said Cooper, a patient of Sutter Health-affiliated Palo Alto Medical Foundation (PAMF) in Mountain View, CA.

What We Want to Achieve

- Improved quality of care/health outcomes
- Better engagement of people in their own health care
- Improved access to data for research purposes
- Enhanced public health information
- Ensure privacy and security of highly sensitive information
- Protect legitimate rights of HC Providers and HC organizations



This is not simply an issue of ownership

Unique (?) Mental Illness Considerations

- Nature and detail of intimate information not the same (current and past)
- Individual's competency can change rapidly and frequently
- Impact of a MI on rational decision making (not a competency issue)
- Potential for opening "vulnerable populations" to abuse and exploitation
- Mature minors
- Psychotherapy notes





Possible Solutions?

- Personal health information custodians
- Graded access internal "firewalls" in the information
- Storage within an independent health data bank
- Advanced directives
- Independent quasi-judicial panels (similar to what currently exists for involuntary admission review)
